

Be Thankful

Thanksgiving is past, and we are looking forward to Christmas. This time of year encourages me to review the past months to affirm all of the "things" God has given to my family and me. All the food! All the gifts! But being thankful is not always about what we have but what we can provide!

One thing that came to my mind in this reflection was the gift of volunteering for the asylum seeker team. The first time I was present to greet the bus, I was able to step onto the entry of the bus and view the people that had just arrived; women, children, babies, men -- locked into the bus with a gate across the aisle. The ICE employees had weapons on their belts. What danger were these tired and hungry families? Everything had been taken away from these people; clothing, shoes, passports, rosaries, and money. What harm could they bring?

As the families exited the bus, I became thankful to greet them with my shining eyes and a big smile (hopefully, they could see it behind my mask). I became thankful to give each child a stuffed animal of their very own. I was thankful when our team leader explained to these new arrivals that they were safe, they are in America, and they had just completed the most difficult part of their journey.

Each team member that serves as a volunteer has a special gift to give away. The ability to speak their language is a gift. The ability to sort clothing at the donation center is a gift. Spending time with a family who wants to tell you about their journey and where they are headed is a gift. The ability to serve a meal to each family is a gift. The ability to sort through coloring books and crayons with a young child who is excited and so thankful; is a gift. The ability to wave goodbye and say "via con Dios" as they leave for the airport – now there is a gift!

As we end this year and move on to the next, I am hopeful for the future. I want to continue to give my gifts of love and service to Asylum Seekers. Maybe, "this isn't your thing." But I pray that each of us will purposefully decide what gift or gifts we want to give away!

Advocacy Spotlight

God's Work, Our Voices

"If you offer your food to the hungry and satisfy the needs of the afflicted, then your light shall rise in the darkness and your gloom be like the noonday," Isaiah 58:10 (NRSV).

FIRST, ADVENT

As the bright, busy holiday season gets underway, Advent arrives, inviting us to a quieter place. During the sacred weeks of candlelight and contemplative music, hope, prophecy, and joy are in the air. We read Isaiah now. We also revisit the Magnificat to hear Mary sing that her soul magnifies the Lord and her spirit rejoices in God. At mid-song, she proclaims, "He has brought down the powerful from their thrones, and lifted up the lowly; he has filled the hungry with good things, and sent the rich away empty," Luke 1:52-53 (NRSV).

During Advent, All Saints people serve as God's hands to fill the hungry with good things. We give gift cards so low-wage families can buy groceries for the holiday. At other times, we cook for people in Family Promise. We fill backpacks for schoolchildren so they and their families can eat on the weekends. We take meals to asylum seekers who pass through our city enroute to their sponsors. We volunteer at Roadrunner Foodbank. Also, there are inspiring individual acts. One member makes land and water available to the Indigenous Farm Hub to help feed the community. Another member stocks her car with food and sleeping bags for people who are unhoused. How many other ways do we respond to hunger? Too many to list.

THEN, ADVOCACY

Filling the hungry with good things can take us in a second direction—to the New Mexico Legislature this January to speak up for justice. To help us prepare, Sherry Hooper of the Food Depot in Santa Fe brought her prophetic voice to the Lutheran Advocacy Ministry Conference this fall. She spoke about a task that her mayor gave the Food Depot: to draw up a plan to end childhood hunger in Santa Fe in a year. She described her reaction. As the head of a food bank, she knew how to end a child's hunger for a day. But to end a child's hunger for life? In that case, we must end poverty, she said. She and her colleagues prepared a report addressing living wages, affordable housing and childcare, and other remedies for hunger. It is exciting. Sherry Hooper and Kurt Rager will be among the advocates in the Roundhouse in 2023 who work to end poverty. I hope you and your family had an enjoyable and restful Thanksgiving.

The Development Committee is working to complete this year's pledge campaign, "Grace in Action." To date we have received 50 (\$167,770) commitments for 2023, which compares to 54 (\$186,420) for 2022. We are thankful for this response to the ministries and programs of ASLC. Letters were mailed, after Thanksgiving, to those that have previously made a commitment and have yet to do so for 2023. If you haven't made your commitment for 2023, you are encouraged to do so by returning your pledge to the church office or leaving it in the offering plate.

As reported last month, as a part of the campaign, we held "Gatherings" after two church services to have a conversation with the congregation about ministries, programs, and finances of the church. Thank you to those that participated, your input is necessary and is very helpful in the development of the ministries and programs of the church.

To help keep you apprised of ASLC financial position, the information in the following table provides a summary of financial information as of the end of October '22.

The information in the above table is positive, during the month of October our revenue exceeded our expenses by \$795.00, on an "operating" basis. On a year-to-date basis, expenses show a decrease of 6.03% (after adjusting for temporarily restricted expenses). At the same time, YTD General Giving is up 8.96% (\$16,163). For the year the preschool is operating with a small gain of \$169.00. Thank you for your support, not only financial, but in all of the other ways you support the work of the church.


• Reorganized all the blueprints and labeled them all.






