I ended 2022 with so much love and gratitude for this community – for each of you and for the congregation we create together. On Christmas Eve, I looked out at the congregation with candles lit singing Silent Night and really wanted to say, "Do you know how beautiful you all look right now?" I am blessed to serve with you in this place.

We go into 2023 in a strong place. We have more pledges, in both number and dollar amount, than we did in 2022. We have a steady 70+ people in worship each week, some in person and some online. I hope that in the coming year – once we are past the winter multi-virus surge – some members we haven't seen for a while will be ready to return to worship and other events.

We also have work to do. Specifically, we have very few people engaged in adult faith formation, even though we claim vibrant faith formation as one of our core values, and growing in faith as part of our mission. A small and energetic Faith Formation team is forming to assist in offering a variety of new opportunities, including a Facebook group for asynchronous learning and discussion. For Lent

we are focusing on sharing our faith stories by preparing devotions written by congregation members and Lenten Wednesdays focusing on stories of faith in life. Please plan now to join us on Wednesdays in Lent and try something new in faith formation in 2023.

Finally, please mark your calendar and plan to attend the Congregational Meeting and Potluck lunch, following worship on February 19.

Welcome to Bethlehem

As I write this article, Christmas is less than a week away. Decorations are everywhere in our neighborhood. Christmas music is playing on the radio and have been sung at church. I think about Pastor Kristin helping the children move Mary and Joseph closer to Bethlehem and the rough stable where Jesus will be born.

I am also thinking about the young families that are making their way to their new homes in the United States. Their journey must be very similar to the one that Mary and Joseph took long ago. Many of the families that I have met when they arrive here in Albuquerque have told me of their long walk from their home to the United States. No, they are not taking trains and planes; they walk with their children thru five countries before they finally arrive in El Paso. They walk over mountains and along rivers. Like Mary and Joseph, they sleep outside, in the cold with only a blanket for cover. Some are helped by "coyotes" along the way, who steal their money and make big promises for what is waiting at the end of their long walk. It takes months and months to travel to their destination in hopes of a better life. Where is that Bethlehem star in their journey? Where is that guiding light?

Their Bethlehem star just might be the twenty or so volunteers who meet these families when they arrive here in Albuquerque. We welcome them with smiles of joy and clapping, with food and toys for the children, with comfort and lodging. They ask us: "Who are you?" And we reply: "We are volunteers. We are here to help you." They ask us: "Why?" And we reply: "Because that is what we do – we help others. We are here to help you get to your destination; your new home." And they hug us and say thank you. "Thank you for helping me."





Dear Friends of Asylum Seekers,

December 2022

The ABQ Asylum Seeker Welcome (AASW) wants to say thank you, thank you to the many friends who have donated money, clothing, and thousands of hours of volunteer time that allows us to be welcoming. We are wrapping up a full year of receiving asylum-seeking families. The need continues, and we will continue with your help.

The families arrive by bus with nothing but the clothes on their back, and a lot of hope that their journey is about to get easier. As faith-based and secular volunteers, we work very hard to help them on their journey to loved ones. We welcome them at a hotel where they have hot showers, privacy, fresh clothing, diapers, shoes, medical attention, and good meals. We also assist them with their travel plans. Most guests are from Latin American countries and are often, first generation immigrants, unlike Cubans, for example, who are firmly

rooted in the U.S. with strong networks. Many of the families we welcome are very limited in both their financial resources and family/friends' networks. Therefore, AASW needs to help more families buy plane and bus tickets, which are ever more expensive since the pandemic began.

Their stories are heart-breaking but truly inspiring both in what they have endured to get here and why they left home in the first place. One 13-year-old boy saw his grandmother murdered before his eyes. Many families have passed through the Darien Gap of Panama, which is a 70-mile trek through the mud and terror of the jungle. They have been beaten and robbed; kidnapped and terrorized; separated from their family members; and still they persevere. Most families spend weeks traveling here. Those few who have resources often fly into Mexico City and take a bus to the border.

Initially, we welcomed a bus of families every other week. Now we receive families weekly, which means providing 50 pairs of shoes, 100 pairs of socks and underwear, warm clothing, hygiene products, backpacks, diapers, and coloring books every week. Gratefully, Second Presbyterian Church, at Lomas and Edith, donates space for our Donation Center. Each week our

wonderful volunteers load up their vehicles and take what is required for a bus of families to a local hotel. (FYI -- The December Donation Request List follows this message.) AASW is extremely grateful to the City of Albuquerque, which is a wonderful partner in our efforts. The city, using FEMA funds, pays for the hotel and meals for the families.

AASW averages spending \$4,000 per bus of families. A wonderful and generous donor has offered us a \$20,000 dollar-for-dollar match for donations. St. Therese of the Little Flower serves as our fiscal sponsor.

Our guests (Asylum Seekers) are with us for only a few days. Consider them travelers passing through our fair city.

When they arrive via bus, exhausted, hungry, longing for a shower, and a gentle bed to sleep in they are only 2 to 3 days away from their long journeys' end. They do not stay in Albuquerque. We serve as a transition stop from ICE to their final destinations.

We alert their sponsors and assist with their travel accommodations. The sponsors finance their travel.

Our volunteers and your generous donations of product and money provide our guests a landing point to clean up, freshen up, relax, and regain their sense of self.

They indulge themselves in multiple showers and enjoy the opportunity to repair their much damaged hair.

Our guests are quite conservative and dress in current simple styles. The women prefer a sports bra, a camisole, non-cotton standard cut underwear, leggings with phone pockets, socks, tennis shoes, and a zippered hoodie or sweatshirt. That's it.

The men are just as simple to please. T-shirts, hoodies, and sweatpants with pockets.

They desire to look their best when they meet their sponsors. We do our best to help make that happen. We encourage groups to buy in bulk or send money and we can purchase in bulk.

We also encourage thrift store, garage sale and estate sales as ways to purchase higher quality clothing and tennis shoes at bargain prices.

We encourage "mini donation drives" among groups such as friends, churches, organizations, and families.

Focus on 1 or 2 items on our list or a category and have your group collect and deliver.

We cannot use dress shoes, leather shoes, heels for the women or work boots and heavy hikers.
Remember they are traveling with children, comfort is fun.

By the time you receive this report, we will have celebrated another Christmas season. I hope your Christmas was filled with joy and fond family memories.

The Development Committee has completed this year's pledge campaign, "Grace in Action," other than sending thank you notes to those that have made a commitment for '23. To date we have received 57 (\$192,370) commitments for 2023, which compares to 54 (\$186,420) for 2022. The dollars committed, for '23, represent a 3.2% increase in comparison to '22. We are thankful for your commitment and in turn your support of the ministries and programs of ASLC.

The next step will be consideration and approval of the '23 Budget at the February Congregational meeting. There will be opportunities, in January, to discuss the proposed budget and to answer your questions.

To help keep you apprised of ASLC financial position, the information in the following table provides a summary of financial information as of the end of November '22.

During the month of November our expenses exceeded our revenues by \$7,692, on an "operating" basis. On a year-to-date basis, expenses show a decrease of 4.96% (after adjusting for temporarily restricted expenses). At the same time, YTD General Giving is up 3.81% (\$7,777). For the year the preschool is operating with a small loss of \$462.

Thank you for your support, not only financial, but in all of the other ways you support the work of the church.
