To help keep you apprised of ASLC's financial position, the information in the following table provides a summary of financial information, for the year, as of the end of September '23.

On a year-to-date basis, expenses show an increase of 1.52% (after adjusting for temporarily restricted expenses). Offerings for the first 9 months are down approximately 3.6% (\$6,326). On a YTD basis, the pre-school financial results show a gain of \$28,652.

Solar Project Update

As of October 20th, the church has signed a contract with Paradise Power Company, Inc. (PPC) to complete the installation of the solar system. PPC estimates it will take approximately 90 days to complete the certification process with the City of Albuquerque and PNM and to complete the inspection and installation work. At the September Congregational Council meeting, the Council approved the expenditure of an additional \$3,750 to complete this last phase of the project. This additional expenditure will bring our total cost to approximately \$82,000, which is below the original estimates of approximately \$100,000.

Music Ministry Notes

What is the best way to use the Book of Psalms? Well, the Psalms are first and foremost prayers to God. As we read the

Psalms, we are praying to God in lament - asking for help, or praise - thanking God for all we have been given. However, even though the Psalms are a form of poetry, they are meant to be sung. You can think of the Book of Psalms as the Bible's own little hymnal.

If that's the case, how are the Psalms different from hymns? During our worship service we make use of both hymns and Psalms. Have you noticed that the Book of Psalms is also in our hymnal? "The song of the Christian assembly has its roots in the psalms of the Hebrew people our forebears in faith." (ELW page 335) Hymns are used to emphasize and support the Word. Psalms are intended for use as a common prayer and proclamation.

When singing, we can also note that the way Psalms and hymns are put together is a bit different. Both are made up of verses, but hymn verses are typically equal in length and rhyme, while Psalm verses are syllabic and typically do not rhyme. There are three ways to sing the Psalms: Chanted, Metrical Singing, and Prose Singing.

When chanting, the music is fitted to the words, specifically to the syllables of the words and it is important to sing the words as naturally as we speak them. The verses are divided into two parts, and we are given indication marks (i) which tell us how to sing. The first part is chanted on one note. The indication mark tells us when to sing the rest of the melody line, which is usually three notes, each note on a different syllable. Sometimes it becomes necessary to elide syllables so that they are easily sung on one note. The music used to chant is called a Tone. You can see different tone examples in the ELW on page 337.

When singing the Psalms metrically, the words are changed to fit the meter of the music and rhyme. This type of Psalm singing is more melodic and hymn-like. We use this type often during the services in which Grace Notes supplies the music.

Singing in prose is when the Psalm is sung as it is written, though the music is more melodic. When this style is used, a cantor or choir sings the verses, and the congregation joins in on the refrain.

So, if the Psalms are meant to be sung, why do we speak them so often? Speaking the Psalms allows us to speak refined and meaningful words. This is a powerful way we can pray together and encourage each other during our worship.



Ephesians 5: 15-20 says, "Be very careful, then, how you live—not as unwise but as wise, making the most of every opportunity, because the days are evil. Therefore, do not be foolish but understand what the Lord's will is. Do not get drunk on wine, which leads to debauchery. Instead, be filled with the Spirit, speaking to one another with psalms, hymns, and songs from the Spirit. Sing and make music from your heart to the Lord, always giving thanks to God the Father for everything, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ."

As the saying goes, "Variety is the spice of life!" It is a good thing to engage our view of the Psalms in many ways.

THE LIFE OF AN ASYLUM SEEKER

A family of four from Ecuador (daughters aged 6 and 4) were traveling through Mexico when they were pulled off the bus by Mexican policemen. They didn't have the money to pay the bribe that was demanded of them. As a consequence, the father was held back while the mother and daughters, one of whom has a significant heart condition, were allowed to proceed on their journey. The family of the father in Ecuador was then extorted for a \$10,000 ransom. They mortgaged everything they could in order to come up with the money, and the father was eventually released.



By that time his wife and daughters had already crossed the border and were in detention. When they arrived in Albuquerque, the father had managed to cross into El Paso. The shelters are so full in El Paso that single men must fend for themselves on the street. He didn't have a phone and didn't have any money. At times he was able to borrow a phone to call his wife, and she was able to leave messages for him on social media. He told his wife that she should bring the family back to El Paso since they didn't have the means to buy tickets to New York, where the father, a baker, had been promised a job.

Fortunately, one of the AASW staff was able to convince her that this was a lousy idea. The father had done an odd job for a sympathetic El Paso resident and had been given \$20. We discovered that a Limosinas bus was leaving for Albuquerque that evening. We sent a message to the husband to go back to the person who had given him money to ask for enough for the bus fare.

Miraculously, that night at 11:00 pm we picked him up from the bus station, sitting alone on a curb in the dark. When he saw his family in the back seat of the car, he hugged his wife, but his daughters were clamoring for him and trapped in their seatbelts, so he body-surfed across them. They had been separated for 25 days at that point. Despite all his tribulations the father hadn't lost his sense of faith and hope. At midnight, we bought the family tickets to New York, and the next morning they were off to the airport to begin the next chapter of their lives.

Sunday, November 19 at 11:30 am in the Fellowship Hall

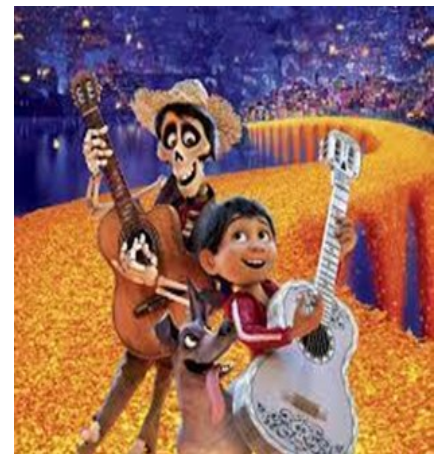
In the third and final discussion in our end of life series, we will talk about making final arrangements and planning for memorial services.
