

ALL SAINTS LUTHERAN CHURCH & PRESCHOOL OCTOBER 2025

"Feed us with hunger for justice," we sang. "Feed us with thirst for peace"

On a Wednesday morning in September, I stood with a group of ELCA pastors, deacons and lay leaders in Upper Senate Park in Washington DC, singing and praying. We were there to make public witness and call for justice on behalf of vulnerable people in our nation, as part of a two-day advocacy training and action event called Gathering at the Gate. I was blessed to be there, and to carry with me the support and care of my All Saints community.

The Gathering at the Gate on September 16-17 was an incredible experience for me. We worshiped and sang and prayed for justice in our world. The witness of the community and hope in our faith held and inspired us. The staff of the ELCA Advocacy office was



there to offer training and encouragement. They reminded us that in an environment where most lobbyists come asking favors for themselves, our witness of faith in asking on behalf of others makes a difference. As people of faith, we carry the witness that all people are created in the image of God, and deserve basic human dignity and human rights. All are beloved of God.

I visited with staff in the offices of both senators from New Mexico. I brought each senator a stack of paper plates with letters from All Saints members asking for support for SNAP and Medicaid – empty plates to symbolize the many Americans whose plates will be empty due to SNAP cuts. Katie Mertens, in the office of Senator Ben Ray Lujan, was so glad to hear voices of faith raising concerns of justice and care. She asked to be put in touch with the ELCA Advocacy office for future partnerships. Aria Campos, in the office of Senator Martin Heinrich, shared that the senator sees a real crisis coming for New Mexico as federal funds for food assistance and Medicaid are ended. She was particularly moved by the witness of the empty plates.

The Gathering was also challenging, as it brought our full attention to the suffering caused by our current administration, not just in regards to hunger and health care, but also regarding ICE detention and attacks on the LGBTQIA+ community. As we gathered in public witness on Wednesday morning, we lifted our voices in lament and demanded justice. We gathered around an empty tablecloth and waved our empty plates to



remember those who are and will be hungry; we gathered around an empty first aid kit to remember those are and will be denied access to basic health care; we gathered around an empty chair to remember all who have been disappeared, detained or erased.

Wednesday afternoon I sat in a senator's office and watched on the closed-circuit TV as a roll

call vote came in on the senate floor. I felt so discouraged by the visual representation of our division – every republican voted yes, every democrat voted no. For a moment, the challenge felt overwhelming.

This Gathering at the Gate is intended to be the first action in a continuing movement of advocacy. Our Christian witness is necessary at this time, difficult as it may be. I have worked for almost 20 years with Lutheran Advocacy Ministry in New Mexico, and I have experienced for myself what former director Ruth Hoffman said, that doing the work of advocacy is like tending redwoods. It is slow and requires so much patience.

On Tuesday morning, before the Gathering started, I visited the National Arboretum. There I saw a Bonsai tree that is 400 years old. It is called the Peace Tree, and it has an amazing history. The tree was cared for by a single family in Japan, beginning in 1625. In 1945, it was just two miles from the epicenter of the atomic bomb strike in Hiroshima – yet it survived, as did the family who cared for it. In 1976, the tree was given as a gift to the United States for the Bicentennial. A sign of reconciliation and peace, a sign of what lasts through the centuries. I gazed at the tree and felt God was



reminding me that we are all in God's hands, that history is larger than the painful now, and that gestures of hope have power.

The Gathering at the Gate was a moment of protest, of accompaniment, of learning – a reminder of God with us now – and an expression of hope for a future we know God holds. Thanks be to God

Look Back with Gratitude and Look Forward with Hope

As Fall begins, the Development Committee has been preparing for our annual campaign to support the church's operating budget for next year. There has been much activity this year concerning the financial picture of the church. The three-year capital campaign, "Building With Hope & Blessings", was initiated with total commitments of \$285,359 as of 09-30-25, and the receipt of \$84,321 of those commitments. For all that have made a commitment we are ever thankful.

This Fall's campaign, "A Chorus of Generosity", will kick off 10-12-25 with commitment Sunday planned for 11-16-25. There will be more information, including temple talks in the coming weeks. As we prepare ourselves for the campaign, please keep the campaign and the ministries of our church in your thoughts and prayers.

To help keep you aware of ASLC financial position, the following table provides a summary of financial information as of the end of August '25. The method of reporting our financial results has changed slightly this year. The table below incorporates that change, which now includes our mortgage loan payments in total expenses.

During the month of August our expenses were greater than our revenues by \$9,551. YTD General Giving is up \$2,483 (1.43%). On a year-to-date basis, expenses show an increase of \$22,211 (10.82%). Included in the expenses are some nonrecurring expenses associated with drainage project, particularly the engineering expense. For the year, the preschool has operated at a loss of \$6,183.




