I have exciting news to share!

All Saints has been accepted into the Equipping Congregations Project through the Caffeinated Church organization and the Episcopal Diocese of CO.

We will work with Deacon Mary Stonebeck, Rocky Mountain Synod Minister for Strategic Communication and Events, to learn new ways to share our stories of connection, faith, and service with people who have been disconnected from church.



On July 12, I met with young adult church members to discuss the project and prepare our congregation's application. We talked about the people outside of church who are longing for belonging and spiritual connection, but have learned to distrust faith communities as places of judgement and exclusion. We are excited to move forward with this project to share our stories of community and knowing God's transforming love in our lives.

In the fall, we will assemble a steering team for the project, and we will need volunteers to share stories and assist with technology for the year-long project and then to sustain a communication plan. Stories for the Nones, Dones, and Disconnected

Equipping Congregations is part of a movement to train churches to tell their stories with clarity, creativity, and confidence. It is a core part of *Show & Tell: Stories for the Nones, Dones, and Disconnected*, an initiative designed to reconnect spiritually curious but institutionally disconnected people—especially Gen Z, Millennials, and Latino communities—with the Christian story. Equipping Congregations is funded by a grant from the Lilly Foundation – there is no cost for congregations to participate, and in fact, we will receive valuable coaching and production assistance at no cost to us.

What the Project Will Do

All Saints will be one of 90 mainline congregations across the mountain states to work at identifying, shaping, and sharing our own compelling stories of hope, faith, belonging, and spiritual vibrancy. We will receive hands-on training, personalized

coaching, and production support to create high-quality short-form videos, along with a sustainable communications and content strategy tailored our congregation.

Together, 90 churches will generate more than 500 new digital stories, each created to meet younger generations where they already are—on TikTok, Instagram Reels, YouTube Shorts, and other channels where authentic, conversational storytelling thrives.

The goal of this project is to help congregations such as All Saints feel more confident using storytelling, digital communication, and simple technology tools to share the ministry already happening in our communities. Over the course of the year, we will build practical skills, confidence, and sustainable practices that can continue long after the project is complete.

I am so excited to be part of this effort to tell our stories of God's love and inclusion to a world that needs to hear such good news! I hope you will find a way to support this effort in the coming year.

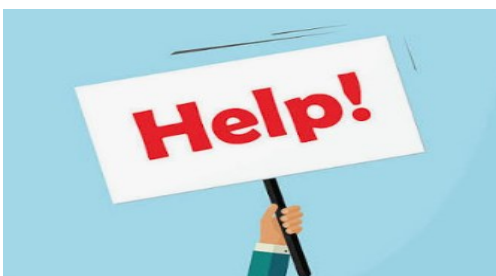


Thank you All Saints, for your Generosity !

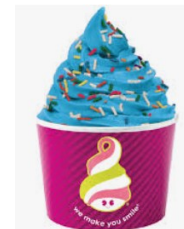

In May we participated in the Bread for the World Offering of Letters. They shared this 2025 Impact Report



You spoke up. Congress listened.

Here are a few major policy victories scored by Bread members in 2025:

Child Tax Credit (CTC): Bread's advocacy helped convince Congress to increase the per-child benefit from \$2,000 to \$2,200.

WIC: In 2024, WIC served almost 40% of all infants in the U.S. Bread's advocacy helped to secure full funding for WIC at \$7.6 billion for FY2025 with no cuts to the Cash Value Benefit, which is used to purchase fresh produce. Bread advocacy also supported the November continuing resolution that ended the government shutdown and fully funded WIC for FY2026 at \$8.2 billion.

International aid: Bread's FY2025 appropriations goals centered on strong funding for international programs that improve nutrition, health, and food security, particularly for women, adolescents, and children. These goals were largely met: Global nutrition was funded at \$168 million, Feed the Future received \$960 million, Food for Peace received \$1.619 billion, and McGovern-Dole Food for Education received \$240 million. Bread's long-term advocacy helped protect Food for Peace, McGovern-Dole, and global nutrition.

Advocacy Note: Thoughts on a (Not) Empty Land, Part 1

From the 1940s to the 1960s, the Western, in films and TV series, dominated screens across the U.S. Especially after World War II, Westerns seemed ubiquitous, and the saga of how the West was won helped build our national identity. Growing up in those decades, I absorbed the media's premise of empty, untamed lands ready for a people to bring progress and a love of liberty. That empty land was ready for ranchers and railroads, farmers and loggers, miners and municipalities. As I watched those shows, I took in scenes of brave pioneers crossing the Great Plains in covered wagons, heading west despite danger from the 'Indians.' My heart raced as bands of fierce warriors suddenly appeared atop a ridge, ready to swoop down on the wagon trains below.

I never thought to ask why the people on the ridge tops might be resisting the white settlers' westward movement—or even if events had actually unfolded as shown on the screen. My education reinforced what I learned from the media: that the western half of North America was largely unpopulated and that white settlers were simply coming to tame an empty land and bring civilization to the few primitive societies they encountered.

I hadn't yet learned of the Indian Removal Act of 1830 that pushed Indigenous societies westward, displacing them far from their homelands. I hadn't yet read historical accounts that offered different scenes from the movies. For example, in 1846, Methodist minister A. B. Meachem watched the Meskwaki people of Iowa being removed from their beloved home to Kansas and wrote: "Who shall ever recount the sorrows and anguish of these people, while they formed in line of march, and turned their eyes for the last time upon the scenes that had been all the world to them."¹ Even if Indigenous nations accommodated the U.S. government and moved west, the settlers kept coming and, with them, the U.S. military to make settlements more secure—the heroic cavalry of our Western movies.

I didn't yet know that the reservations onto which the Indigenous people were eventually placed didn't belong to them but were held in trust by the U.S. government. I didn't know that situations can happen on reservations against the Indigenous people's will—like the building of the Poston Internment Camp on the Colorado Indian Tribes Reservation near Yuma, Arizona, to detain Japanese Americans during World War II. The tribes protested, not wanting reservation land to host such a painful project, but they lacked legal power to assert their will.

I didn't yet know about the U.S. government's Termination policy, which prevailed from the 1940s through the 1960s. The policy meant to end tribal sovereignty, to end the trust lands relationship and force Indigenous people to give up their cultures and assimilate. Once lands were allotted to individual Indigenous people and no longer held communally, the way was paved for more development of what once were reservation lands. Termination would bring progress. Finally, in the mid-1960s, President Lyndon Johnson stopped enforcing the policy, and President Richard Nixon officially ended it, stating that, in his judgment, it was wrong.

Sarah Augustine, a Mennonite of Tewa heritage, cofounded the Coalition to Dismantle the Doctrine of Discovery . She helps fellow people of faith reframe the settler narrative. She widens the frame so that we see not only the Euro-American perspective but that of Native peoples too. Then, she asks us to advocate. In her book, *The Land Is Not Empty: Following Jesus in Dismantling the Doctrine of Discovery*, she cites the Prophets and Jesus to remind us “. . . that God's people are responsible for more than their individual sins. . . .” We must address our societal transgressions, too. Together, we can explore how, as people of the ELCA, we can continue our own work toward Truth and Healing with our Indigenous siblings.
